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Urge Committee Members to Oppose HB 501--CALL Alert for February 13, 2015

HB 501 (Fant) relating to limitations of actions will be considered on Tuesday, at 9:00 in the House Civil Justice Subcommittee. The bill would shorten the Statute of Repose in Florida from the current ten (10) years, all the way down to seven (7) years.

The Statute of Repose is the statute that operates as an absolute bar to any construction defect claim, despite the fact that the statute of limitations on a claim <u>may not</u> have already expired.

For example, an association will not be able to sue for construction defects until after the association has been turned over from the developer (because while the association is in the control of the developer, the developer will not sue itself!). However, the Condominium Act allows a developer to hold turnover until 7 years after the Declaration of Condominium is recorded. If the statute of repose (which acts as an absolute bar to construction claims) is shortened to 7 years, there would no way for some condominium associations to obtain relief from the developer on construction defect claims.
